In Focus

Rotary Club of Singapore Major Project 2007/2008

What is Major Project?

Every Rotary Major Project is the flagship project of the Rotary President for the year.

It is the project that a President is remembered for, long after his term of office. The Major Project is also the 'face' of the Club. It is what shows to the community that Rotary cares and Rotary shares. It is the vehicle for members to do their part for the community.

All club members are expected to make voluntary contributions to make it a success.

Projects Considered

For this Rotary year, we considered projects or activities of seven institutions to adopt as Major Project.

1. National Arts Council

a. Arts Professional Development: \$200,000 per year for 5 years (total \$1,000,000) or \$120,000 per year for 5 years (total \$600,000). Support about 100 of such capability development projects. b. Arts Fellowship: \$120,000 per year for 5 years (total \$600,000) for 3 to 4 applicants per year or \$80,000 per year for 5 years (total The Major Project \$400,000). committee decided not to pursue either of these projects as the commitment is too large and flows into following years.

2. <u>Scholarship for local eye</u> <u>surgeons in India</u>

A scholarship of \$3,000 each for young, newly qualified eye surgeons from Singapore to be trained in India for 3 months.

Project was not pursued, as it needs NUS medical faculty and government collaboration.

3. Society of the Servants of the Lord

Purchase of a second hand passenger van to transport residents (of home for aged and battered wives and husbands) to hospitals and attend functions. Project not pursued as application was withdrawn.

4. MDAS (Muscular Dystrophy Association Singapore)

<u>a. Biz-Power Project:</u> \$40,000 p.a. for job preparation training. <u>b. M-Power Equipment Grant:</u> \$30,000 p.a. as subsidy for purchase of motorized wheelchair, lifting hoist, breathing apparatus. Project not pursued as application was submitted too late for us to invite them to make presentation to club.



5. RSVP Singapore

Formerly known as Retired Senior Volunteer Programme Singapore, the

organization was started in 1998 by our own member, PDG Dr Philbert Chin at the request of PDG Dr Robert Loh who was then President of National Council of Social Services. They provide two kinds of client services: keeping members (seniors) active and making their lives meaningful and enjoyable through volunteerism, and serving the community using members' talents and skills. RSVP needs to

raise \$384K this year for their activities, expecting \$100,000 to come from our Club.

Their programmes are:

- a. <u>Cyberguide</u>: introduce computer literacy to seniors, such as basic computer skills, surfing, email, voice-over-internet protocol etc.
- **<u>b. Mentoring</u>**: help latch key children who stay back in school, as both parents are working.
- <u>C. Mentally Disadvantaged</u><u>Outreach</u>: help former Institute of Mental Patients to get back to society.
- d. Changi Airport Ambassador: provide assistance to foreign visitors as they land in Changi airport, making their visit to Singapore more memorable.
- e. Public Education: provide three to four talks per month, open to public. Topics range from IT, retirement planning, health etc.
- f. Polytechnic Students
 Outreach: assist in orienting
 foreign polytechnic students on
 living in Singapore, such as use of
 public transport, buying cell phones
 etc.
- **g. Hosting:** host foreign visitors at home at the request of Ministry of Foreign Affairs.
- h. Partnership In Health: guide visitors on the exhibits put up by Health Promotion Board at the Singapore General Hospital.
- i. Alzheimer's Training Centre:
 in planning stage.
 We recommend RSVP for consideration.



6. <u>Singapore</u> <u>Association of</u> <u>Visually</u> <u>Handicapped</u>

SAVH, which we have regularly

supported yearly in their International Cane Day celebration, has three basic services.

a. Low Vision Clinic For Children: A special school for children who need special facilities and specially trained teachers.

b. A Vision Rehabilitation
 Centre: Rehabilitative care and advisory to overcome the obstacle for not being able to see.

Small Social Enterprise: A self-help programme and providing education to create public Activities include a awareness. mobile team of 32 certified masseurs, "Dine in the Dark" programme to create public awareness, Braille, Audio, Talking Library, etc

They have not been stated their expectation from us, but they need \$1.2m per year for running costs. We recommend **SAVH** for consideration.



7. Epilepsy Care Group (Singapore)

Α voluntary welfare organization and registered charity since 1993, this provides non-medical group services and support for children and adults with epilepsy, along with their caregivers. They have provide requested us to sponsorship for the acquisition of a dragon boat. Team members in the boat include persons with epilepsy and volunteers. Volunteer-patient ratio of 2:1 will be kept in the dragon boat.

Objectives of dragon boat activities: a. Raise public awareness of epilepsy. b. Build confidence and boost self-esteem of people with epilepsy by helping them to overcome their fear of water sports. c. Facilitate social integration of people afflicted with epilepsy with the general public. d. Encourage and foster team building. e. Provide an additional avenue to recruit and nurture volunteers.

Boat Acquisition Cost: \$23,980 vs Rental Cost: \$ 3840 per annum (\$40 per session).

We also recommend this project for your consideration, particularly for the potential publicity our Club will have (eg, boat will show Rotary logo).

The decisions we have to make:

Committee suggests **Target Fund to Raise:** \$50,000 to \$150,000.

We invite members to provide input on:

- 1. Which project (s) to select.
- 2. How much do we provide for each?
- 3. How do we raise the fund?
 - a. Members' contributions? How?
 - b. Should we invite outside partners to team up with us?
 - c. Organise a film premiere?

"Singapore's Economy – 2007 Review & Prospects for 2008" by Rotarian Phillip Overmyer and "SDG-Master Technology by Mr. Heinrich Schweizer

Speakers Introduction:

Director Joseph Chia introduced fellow member, **Rtn. Phillip Overmyer** who is the Chief Executive of the Singapore International Chamber of Commerce. **Rtn. Kai Taenzler** introduced the other Speaker **Mr. Heinrich Schweizer**, from Switzerland who is a composer and lecturer at various conservatories in China, Australia and Germany.

Speakers:

First to address the Club was Rtn. Phillip who noted that with the recent decline in the market, some of the statistics in his presentation material would have to be further revised!

Rtn. Phillip cited Advance GDP Estimates for 2007 and the 2008 Economic Forecast for Singapore. He spoke of the challenges to Singapore's evolving economy. He elaborated on challenges such as the high cost of doing business in Singapore as compared to other

countries, MNCs exploring alternative locations for their businesses, and the lack of service workers.

Next, Mr. Schweizer spoke of a new innovation in the field of digital audio technology, a new generation-CD, which had the advantage in that it could be played on all commercially available CD players.

Mr. Schweizer interspersed his talk with excerpts of musical tracks from the SDG master-CD to illustrate the superior sound quality.

Phillip for a very insightful presentation and expressed his hope that the stock market would recover soon. Rtn.
